CONSTITUTION AND RULES 1954

Preamble. The Catholic Biblical Association founded at Sydney on the feast of St. Jerome, 1952, is under the heavenly patronage of that great Doctor of Biblical Learning.

Purpose. Its aim is threefold: 1) To promote the study of Divine Scriptures in accordance with the instructions of the Holy See, in the spirit of the Catholic Church and in accordance with modern scientific progress in biblical learning and in all those fields of research which throw special light on the written Word of God; 2) To promote fraternity and communication between Australian Catholic Scholars who are assigned to the work of teaching expounding or defending Holy Writ, or who cultivate studies closely connected with biblical science; 3) To help all those who in pastoral work, in schools, or in the lay apostolate are building up the knowledge of Christian doctrine on the sure foundation of the faith of the Church as set forth in the Catechism.

Membership. For the present there shall be two classes of members: Active Members and Associate Members. As the Association grows, we hope also to have members who shall be called Life Members or patrons.

Active Members are those who have special qualifications for Scripture studies and are in some degree specialists in this field.

Any person, institution, or group interested in the aims of the Association and recommended by one or more active members may be admitted to Associate Membership.

All members, active and associate, shall pay an annual fee of £1. The payment of this fee, which seems sufficient for present needs, shall entitle the particular member, as from January, 1955, or from the time of his enrolment, to receive the Quarterly (entitled "Scripture") of the Catholic Biblical Association of England, with which the Association of Australia has special ties of fraternity.

Activities of the Association. Since the Catholic Biblical Association is primarily intended to be a fellowship of professional Scripturists, its first endeavours shall be to keep its active members in close touch with each other by group meetings held at appointed times — which group meeting shall furnish occasion for reports from members, discussions of biblical questions, the reading of communications from overseas scholars, and the elaboration of programmes of biblical work.

According to the saying of the Wisdom of Ben Sirach otherwise called Ecclesiasticus (XXXIV, 47): "I have not laboured for myself only, but for all who seek out the truth," the Catholic Biblical Association will devote itself to the propagation and popularization of Bible acknowledge by public lectures and conferences, by answering questions sent to the secretary, and as time goes on, by biblical week-ends and biblical weeks. It is hoped that before long the Association will have a periodical publication of its own.

Officers: A Society, which is in its infancy, does not require nor even admit the machinery of administration which an adult organization demands. Consequently, there is no question just now of special committees, of an editorial board, a board of trustees, and such like. For present needs a simple organization will suffice.

Under the gracious patronage of His Eminence the Cardinal Archbishop of Sydney and the honorary presidency of their Lordships, the two Auxiliary Bishops, there shall be a chairman, a vice-chairman, a secretary and an editor.

In the absence of the Patron or one of the honorary Presidents, the Chairman shall preside over meetings and act as chief executive officer. The Vice-Chairman supplies his place as often as is needful.

The Secretary shall be the chief organizer of the Association's activities. He shall keep minutes of the meetings, make records of whatever is to be recorded, send out communications and notices at the direction

of the Chairman and, for the present, also act as Treasurer.

The Editor shall be consulted on all communications to the Press, and shall examine any writings prepared for publication by the Association as such.

The President and Vice-President shall be elected annually. The Secretary and Editor shall hold office for three years.

An annual meeting of Active Members shall hear the annual report of the Secretary, and shall attend to the election of officers and to any business that needs discussion and decision. This meeting shall be held on the feast of St. Jerome or on the day most convenient about that time. A High Mass shall be arranged on or about the feast of St. Jerome. Members should cultivate special devotion to their great Patron and to the Holy Spirit "who spoke through the Prophets."

As these Statutes are provisional, they shall be amended, changed, or supplemented, as soon as a majority of the Active Members judge necessary.

The Annual Conference and General Meeting of the Catholic Biblical Association of Australia was held last week, August 9-12, at St. John's University College. It marked a significant step in the history of this Association.

Twenty-five biblical scholars, including Fathers R. Cox C.M. and M. O'Meeghan S.M. of New Zealand, participated in the proceeds.

The Conference was organized by the Sydney regional group under the patronage of His Eminence Cardinal Gilroy, D.D. His Lordship Bishop Freeman D.D. presided at the opening session.

The four principal papers were presented by Fathers D. Murphy M.S.C. of Melbourne, L. Branagan C.SS.R. of Ballarat, F. Mecham of Springwood and Camillus Hay O.F.M. of Melbourne. These treated of the historical value, liturgical character, language and patristic exeges of our Gospel according to St. John.

Other papers concerned with this same Gospel were presented by Fathers R. Maher O.P. of Melbourne, L. Hannigan S.M. of Toongabbie, Jerome Crowe C.P. of Adelaide, C. Baker of North Turramurra and H. Davis of Manly. These dealt with the Prologue to the Gospel, the significance of the title "Lamb of God", the washing of the disciples' feet before the Last Supper, the place of Mary and the Church in the writings attributed to St. John and the question of Our Lady's residence at Ephesus.

Papers treating of problems in present-day apologetics, the sacramentality of Scripture, Confession considered in its New Testament context and the "Our Father" were presented by Fathers K. Walsh of Manly, K. O'Shea C.SS.R. of Ballarat, Angelo O'Hagan O.F.M. of Melbourne and M. Spora of St. Mary's Cathedral.

A special feature of the Conference was the summary given by Father W. Dalton S.J. of Pymble of the thesis which won for him last year the degree of Doctor of Sacred Scripture from the Pontifical Biblical Institute. This brilliant thesis deals with the interpretation of I Peter 3, 19 which concerns Christ's proclamation to the spirits in prison. It is to be published by the Pontifical Biblical Institute in the New Year.

Father I. Sanders C.M. of Eastwood, who acted as President during the proceedings, outlined his views on problems associated with the teaching of Scripture in Seminaries at the beginning of the special Forum devoted to this subject and guided the ensuing discussion.

The main business of the General Meeting was to give formal approval to the Constitutions of the Association. This was duly done after much thought and discussion. The Association is now finally and definitely established as a national body.

The dream of the late Dr. W. Leonard has now been realized.

Ten years ago, Dr. Leonard contacted the small group of Catholic biblical scholars then in Sydney. They formed a Catholic a Biblical Association which has now become the Sydney regional group of the Australian Association.

The members of the original Association met from time to time to exchange methods and ideas and did whatever was possible at that time to promote a deeper understanding among Catholics and non -Catholics of the teachings of the Church regarding the Bible.

Under the enthusiastic leadership of Father H. Davis of Manly and encouraged by His Eminence Cardinal Gilroy D.D., this original Sydney group brought Father Alexander Jones from England in 1959 and organized the Biblical Congress at which he was Guest Lecturer.

Meanwhile, a similar Association had been formed by a group of Catholic biblical scholars in Melbourne. The members of the Sydney and Melbourne groups cooperated with Father I. Sanders C.M. in organizing the lecture tour of Father Bruce Vawter C.M. in 1962. During this tour, the members of the two groups met in Melbourne. It was decided to establish the Catholic Biblical Association on a national basis. Father H. Davis of Manly became the first President of this national Association.

The first annual meeting of the national Association was held in Melbourne during Pentecost Week of last year. Provisional Constitutions were drawn up and arrangements made for last week's National Conference and General Meeting in Sydney.

Besides promoting better mutual acquaintance and the exchange of ideas and methods among its active members, the Association also aims to help those engaged in pastoral work, in schools, or in the lay apostolate.

In recent months Conferences have been given to priests in Melbourne and Maitland. Members have cooperated with the Directors of Education in these two centres to provide Summer Schools and regular weekly lectures for religious teachers in Catholic Schools. Occasional lectures have also been given to priests and religious teachers in Sydney, Adelaide and Ballarat.

Lectures have also been given for the laity. These have been organized by the Newman Graduate Association, the Guild of St. Pius X and the Grail.

Demands made on the Association are increasing with the greater emphasis now given to biblical studies in Catholic Schools and as a result of renewed interest in the liturgy.

Any person or group in sympathy with the work or aims of the Catholic Biblical Association may be duly admitted to associate membership. Any eligible person can become a patron or life member of the Association. Qualified biblical specialists or these who have done some special study in this field are eligible for active membership.

BUSINESS: 1. Constitutions:

On the motion of Rev. Angelo O'Hagan O.F.M., seconded by Rev. W. Dalton S.J., the text of the Provisional Constitutions was approved with the following amendments and By-Laws:

- (a) Amendment In Art. V, 5b, after the words "to accept and edit manuscripts for publication in this official organ" insert "or under the auspices of this Association". As it was thought unlikely that the association would be able to publish its own official journal for some time, Members resolved that this clause should be added in case the Association should publish in partnership with the Theological or other Society or Association. This clause would also cover any pamphlets or books published under the auspices of the Association.
 - (b) <u>By-Laws</u> I. (Art. III, 1) Members of the Association shall pay an annual membership fee of one pound. New members shall pay an entrance fee of two guineas.

II. (Art. III, 2) The Regional Groups or, in areas where no Regional

Group has yet been established, the Executive Board will determine whether candidates for Active Membership are qualified by virtue of "special work" in the biblical field.

This requirement shall be interpreted in the broadest sense consonant with active participation in the activities of the Association.

III. (Art. III, 4) The fee to be paid by a Patron or Life Member shall

be

twenty pounds.

2. Interpretation of Constitutions:

(Art. III, 1) On the motion of Rev. D. Murphy M.S.C. seconded by Rev. Campion Murray O.F.M., it was resolved that all participants in this National Conference and Annual General Meeting together with all members of Regional Groups be declared eligible for Active Membership of the Association.

(Art. III, 5) Rev. H. Davis queried the wording of this Section, as he doubted whether it secured sufficiently the national structure and identity of the Association. After some discussion it was resolved, on the motion of Rev. L. Branagan C.SS.R. seconded by Rev. C. Baker, to leave the wording as in the provisional text. It was the opinion of members that Sections 1 and 4 provided adequate controls of Regional Groups.

3. Nat.Conference and General Meeting in 1965:

Resolved that this be held in Melbourne, the Regional Group to complete arrangements with the approval of the Executive Board. Agreed that the mid-Winter vacation period was the most suitable but, as dates do not coincide, some time at the beginning of August would be the best compromise.

Article I

The full name of this Association shall be THE CATHOLIC BIBLICAL ASSOCIATION OF AUSTRALIA.

Article II

Purpose

- <u>Section 1</u>. The general aim of this Association shall be to promote scientific study of the Bible in accordance with the spirit and instructions of the Church.
- <u>Section 2</u>. The special aims of this Association shall be
 - (a) to promote a better mutual acquaintance among Catholic biblical scholars and to facilitate the exchange of methods and ideas.
 - (b) to expound the teachings of the Church regarding the Bible and to promote deeper understanding among Catholic and non-Catholic scholars.
 - (c) to help those who are engaged in pastoral work, in schools, or in the lay apostolate.

Article III

Membership

- <u>Section 1.</u> The Membership of this Association shall consist of Active Members and Associate Members. All Members shall pay the same dues, and all shall enjoy the same rights and privileges except that only Active Members shall exercise active and passive voice.
- <u>Section 2.</u> Candidates for Active Membership must be sponsored by a least one Active Member and be approved by the respective Regional Group or Executive Board. They must be qualified biblical specialists either by reason of their degrees or be reason of spe cial work in this field.
- <u>Section 3</u>. Any person or group in sympathy with the aims of this Association may be duly admitted to Associate Membership.
- <u>Section 4</u>. Any eligible person may become a Patron or Life Member by the sum specified in the By-Laws.

OF

AUSTRALIA

Article IV

Administration

- <u>Section 1</u>. The ultimate authority in this Association shall reside in the Active Members duly assembled in General Meeting.
- <u>Section 2</u>. Between General Meetings this Association shall be governed by an Executive Board consisting of a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary, a Treasurer and an Editor.
- <u>Section 3</u>. The Executive Board shall meet at least at the time of the General Meeting. The President may call meetings at other times during the year.
- <u>Section</u>. 4. The Executive Board has the power to formally approve and recognize Regional Groups of this Association. It also has the power to withdraw such approval and recognition.
- <u>Section 5</u>. Subject to the supreme authority, duly formed Regional Groups have authority in their region according to their Statutes.
- <u>Section 6</u>. The fees paid by Members shall be administered by the Executive Board of this Association. However, Regional Groups have the administration of funds raised by the activities of their Groups.

Article V

Duties of the Officers

Section 1. The duties of the President shall be

- (a) to act as the chief executive officer of this Association.
- (b) to preside at the General Meeting and at meetings of the Executive Board. Section 2.

The duties of the Vice-President shall be

- (a) to assist the President in his duties.
- (b) to act as substitute for the President in the latter's absence from the General Meeting or from a meeting of the Executive Board.

Section 3. The duties of the Secretary shall be

- (a) to record the Minutes of the meetings of the Executive Board and to keep the records and papers of this Association.
- (b) to conduct the correspondence and ordinary administrative affairs of the Association according to the instructions of the Executive Board.
- (c) to issue official communications to Members at the direction of the President.
- (d) to record the Minutes of General Meetings.

Section 4. The duties of the Treasurer shall be

(a) to receive the funds of this Association and to make disbursements as provided for by the By-Laws or the Executive Board or by the Members in General

Meeting.

- (b) to act as business manager of the periodical publications of the Association.
- (c) to submit to General Meetings a financial statement of the income and expenses of the Association.
 - (d) to submit on request a financial statement to the members of the Executive Board.

Section 5. The duties of the Editor shall be

- (a) to prepare for publication the official organ of this Association.
- (b) to accept and edit manuscripts for publication in this official organ, or under the auspices of this Association, after due consultation with the members of the Editorial Board. This Editorial Board may in practice be the Executive Board.

Article VI

Election of Officers

<u>Section 1</u>. The President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer and Editor shall be elected at the General Meeting and their term of office shall extend from the end of the General Meeting at which they have been elected until the end of the next General Meeting; the Secretary, however, shall be elected for a three-year term. The President and Vice-President shall be ineligible for immediate reelection to their respective offices.

Article VII

Activities

- <u>Section 1</u>. General Meetings of the Members shall be held annually. The nature and frequency of the meetings of Regional Groups will be governed by their respective Statutes. - <u>Section 2</u>. Both the General Meeting and the Regional Groups will see to the organizing and giving of study days devoted to biblical subjects for Associate members.
- <u>Section 3</u>. The Executive Board and the Regional Groups shall work for the propagation and popularization of knowledge of the Bible by public lectures and conferences, and by answering questions.
- Section 4. The Association will publish a periodical as its official organ.

BY-LAWS

- III. (Art.III,4) The fee to be paid by a patron or Life Member shall be twenty pounds.

 - (a) Sydney: Fr. Baker reported that there were now two meetings a year; members were encouraged to attend the meetings of the Fellowship of Biblical Studies (six meetings a year). The Sydney C.B.A. is now in its fourth year of providing a series of talks to the people. This year members worked through the CCD, lecturing in four centres around the city. Attendance was encouraging: from over 100 to 30, depending on the area. Those attending nowadays are not the Religious (they already attend other courses) but the ordinary faithful—an encouraging sight. So the CBA here is largely for the education of the people in the Bible.
 - (b) Melbourne: Fr. Scullion reported that the CBA there has not functioned for years, mainly because almost half of the Fellowship of Biblical Studies lectures have been given by CBA members and there is no need for separate meetings. Also members are providing Scripture courses in the various theological institutes around Melbourne, including Saturday I lectures to teachers of Biblical Studies. Fr. Scullion reported on the theological training in Melbourne, giving details of the new primary degree in theology which, by an act of the Victorian Parliament, can now be given. Lectures for this course are provided at the United Faculty of Theology, Catholic College and the Yarra Theological Union.
- 6. Treasurer's Report: In the absence of the Treasurer no report was offered. It is understood that there would be no substantial changes from last year's report. Membership fees for 1973 were waived.

7. General Business:

(a) Future of the C.B.A. of Australia. Its next meeting. After much fruitful discussion in which the members were unanimous in insisting that the CBA should continue to function, it was decided that a letter and questionnaire be sent to all members (copy affixed). The date and nature of the next meeting will be decided upon once the replies to the questionnaire have been assessed by the incoming committee.

On the 19th August the annual National Conference of the CBA of Australia held its meeting at St. John's College, University of Sydney.

After much fruitful discussion in which the members were unanimous in insisting that the CBA should continue to function, it was decided that a letter and questionnaire be sent to all members of our association and that the following points be included:

- (1) The members present at the meeting were of the opinion that the next meeting of the CBA should be held at a different time to the ANZSTS conference. One reason for the original change in date of the CBA meeting to coincide with ANZSTS was that our members could give our full support to that organization. We feel that it is now well on its feet. Furthermore, our members often prefer to work around a theme, unlike ANZSTS. It is important too that there be a forum for Catholic scholarship which is both sought after and respected by Protestant theologians.
- (2) The members thought the meeting should continue for at least a day and a half, preferably on a week-end during term. It would be a short live-in.
- (3) The members further thought that next year, the conference might discuss justification and original sin in Protestant and Catholic theology or else the part play by creation theology in revitalizing theology as a whole (Westermann).
- (4) But the above three points may not be acceptable to the vast majority of CBA members who were unable to attend this year's meeting. THE CATHOLIC BIBLICAL ASSOCIATION OF AUSTRALIA

Report of the ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING, held at Manly, 17-19 May, 1981

The meeting was held in conjunction with the Catholic Theological Association. It seemed to your scribe that the organizational pattern for the meeting was greeted by all participants as by far the most successful of those tried in recent years. Major sessions of mutual interest to both associations were scheduled as joint sessions; sessions of more specialized concern were scheduled in parallel. The result was much greater communication between theologians and exegetes than was possible before. The joint sessions gave plenty of stimulus for thought and discussion; the breaks and meals gave plenty of opportunity for following up what had been begun in the sessions.

There were some thirty participants registered, nineteen of them members of the CBA. Three joint sessions were held: Brendan Byrne (CBA), "The Problem of Son of Man and Messiah"; John Thornhill (CTA), "Reflections on the Renewal of Theological Method"; David Coffey (CTA), "Death as a Question of Negative Theology". Specialist papers were delivered to the CBC by R. C. Hill, M. Fitzpatrick, and A. F. Campbell. There was a session of the Continuing Seminar on the Patriarchal Narratives, in which J. J. Scullion was the principal contributor.

The following are brief summaries of the papers read by CBA members.

BRENDAN BYRNE: "The Problem of Son of Man and Messiah"

The statement of the aim of John's Gospel in 20:31 suggests that the title, "Christos-Messiah", has greater significance than that ascribed to it in recent Johannine studies. These studies have linked "Christos" with inadequate faith, seeing the expression of "correct" faith as coming in titles such as "Son of Man", "Son of God", "I AM", etc. Byrne argued that correct faith is not so much a matter of arriving at the right title as of accepting that Jesus — as the <u>Crucified</u> One — is the bearer of all these titles. In particular, proceeding from Chap. 12, "Son of Man" should not be isolated from "Christos-Messiah" but seen as itself an expression of messianic status used by the Evangelist to relate "Christos-Messiah" to the Cross.

CHARLES HILL: "Akribeia: A Principle of Chrysostom's Exegesis"

The key concepts can be isolated as follows:

= (divine) considerateness NOT condescension
= (human) limitation NOT weakness
= precision NOT accuracy

Chrysostom's conviction emerges that every item in the text of scripture is valuable and not to be passed over heedlessly. Behind this is C.'s conviction that there is nothing idle or accidental in scripture. The conclusion: C.'s insistence on the precision and care which must mark the approach of the interpreter. The approach of the exegete must bear the qualities which mark the text itself

MICHAEL FITZPATRICK: :Jesus and His Adversaries: Reflections on A.J. Hultgren's Study of the Synoptic Conflict Stories"

FitzPatrick discussed <u>Jesus and His Adversaries</u>, by A. J. Hultgren. The genre of the conflict story was delineated, with attention paid to two sub-groups, the unitary and non-unitary stories. A couple of weaknesses in the book were looked at closely. One involved a trajectory from the Gospel of Thomas (Logion #100) through Mark to Matthew; the other a trajectory from a pre-Markan collection through Mark to Matthew. Positive aspects of the study were stressed: its integration of form criticism and synoptic studies (e.g. the more complete form need not be the earliest; Matthew tends to polish the forms he uses); the treatment of setting is eminently sensible. The setting for the conflict stories appears to be most sensibly seen as inner Christian apologetic, arising from Jewish opposition, but directed toward confirming Christian convictions.

ANTONY CAMPBELL: Samuel and Qumran - Text Criticism

Campbell took the question of Samuel's Nazirite status as an example of the issues raised in text criticism by the Qumran discoveries. The widely differing presentations in the Samuel, Judges, and Numbers material on the Nazirite were noted. It is by no means certain that the common forms of the same institution should be sought in all three. Text critically, Vulgate and Targum follow MT, LXX and 4QSam provide a more extended text, expanding on Samuel's Nazirite status. It is tempting to accept the new Qumran readings as preferable (so McCarter, AB); Campbell adduced reasons for caution. 4QS am, perhaps independently of LXX, certainly witnesses to a tradition that Samuel was indeed a Nazirite. But that does not mean that it witnesses unambiguously to assumed original readings which alone are correct. Two final comments were made: 1) S. Talmon has raised the question whether a single Urtext broke up or whether primal traditions which varied among themselves to a limited degree progressively lost their lease on life; 2) Campbell argued that no matter what options the Versions may offer, the decision whether they are required in order to make sense the text is always an exegetical decision.

CONTINUING SEMINAR: The Patriarchal Narratives

- J.J. Scullion drew attention to recent publications:
- Jacob Licht, Storytelling in the Bible (Jerusalem: Magnes, 1978).
- David Clines, The Theme of the Pentateuch (JSCT, Suppl. 10, esp. pp. 32-43).
- Claus Westermann, Genesis 12-36, is now available as BK I/2.

A few isolated comments from Scullion's discussion of Westermann:

- There is no E strand in Genesis. Rather there is additional material from variants (oral) co-existing with J & P.
- <u>Berit</u> in Gen 9, 15, & 17. Westermann argues against uniform translation by Bund or Covenant. The meaning is to come from the context: in Gen 9, solemn assurance; in Gen 15 & 17, God's solemn promise.
- The patriarchal narratives are not in the <u>Urzeit</u> (pre-history), but they are not in history either. They are situated in that period before history-writing, institutions, or formal cult have been developed. They are not stories of "what really happened". Two elements are central: (1) the nomadic way of life, mobility; 2) personal worship and encounter with God.

Report of Seminar: Scribe - M. A. O'Brien

The chairman of the seminar invited contributions from conference members. The following members gave contributions, which were followed by discussions.

1) R. Gearish: gave a report on some recent study of the writing of <u>aims</u> and <u>objectives</u> for courses, with a view to clarifying a lecturer's purpose in giving a course and assessment of students taking a course.

<u>Aims</u>: This section of a course description is primarily for the lecturer. It is concerned with the philosophy behind the course, and is broader than an immediate aim. One aims at promoting understanding, development, for example. The aim of a course does not deal with behavioural concerns.

Objectives: This is primarily concerned with the student. As a result of taking a course, a student should be able toetc. It is more concerned with behaviour. Objectives are kept in mind for assessment.

A sample course - Survey of the O.T. was used to illustrate aspects of the above.

<u>Discussion</u>: There was some discussion about the validity of such terms and the distinction between them. The meeting felt while terminology is a debatable matter, the concern for the lecturer's intention and the achievement of this in a course for students was valuable material for the sort of courses taught by members. G. also circulated a <u>lecturer assessment</u> sheet for members. There was some discussion about how to accurately interpret the information provided by such a sheet.

2) $\underline{T \text{ Goodall}}$: spoke – a) on the structuring of courses and their relationship, particularly for N.T. courses. G. proposes a restructuring – for Manly Seminary – of Scripture on a 6 semester basis.

<u>Discussion</u>: There was some discussion of how much one could deal with in a term/semester course. For example, is it possible to deal adequately with two Gospels?

- b) on the teaching of Scripture, with special reference to the article by Montague, G.T., "Hermeneutics and the Teaching of Scripture," CBQ 41, 1(1979) 1-17; and to a review of Wink's book <u>Transforming Bible Study</u> by B.Robinson in Heythrop Journal (1983) The celebration objective was raised as an important issue in the teaching of Scripture.

<u>Discussion</u>: There was some lively discussion about what sort of experience is involved in the encounter with Scripture. Your scribe offers a threadbare report only. It seems that the discussion at one stage was talking about the experience that the text generates in the reader. The encounter with (entry into) characters in the text was mentioned. A query was raised about whether such an encounter was too subjective, or does the power of the text and the characters therein challenge the reader and 'interpret' him/her. On the other hand the discussion examined whether an objective critical presentation could lead students to face the questions and crises of the biblical community, and thus enable them to encounter and experience the text. Is this a participation in the experience that generated the present text?

There was some criticism of Montague's steps in the teaching of Scripture, and the possibility/suitability of covering all these in one course. The value of other texts besides the Bible to enable students to share the experience of the biblical text was briefly discussed. As well, the spiritual background and formation of authors/lecturers/ students and the influence these have on perceptions and concerns was raised. The different situations of lay people, religious, priests was also noted.

- 3) A.F. Campbell: gave a presentation with accompanying sheet circulated of how he leads students to an experience of the text. C. spoke about the types of reactions of students to this method; one can see the learning process working at different levels: for example, in those who are quick to see <u>answers</u> and those who may not see answers readily, but are led by the method to see the <u>problems</u> and questions posed by such a study of the text.
- 4) <u>J. Sobb</u>: spoke on his work in training RE teachers for Catholic Primary Schools. The problems in this area are, urgency of need, the lack of adequate training for the RE task so far, and the necessity for suitable structuring of courses, and control of teacher training for RE.

S. also outlined the distinctions between <u>accreditation</u> and <u>professional training</u>. There is need for some endorsement of professional training which does not become confused with accreditation.

<u>Discussion</u>: There was some discussion about a minimum course in Biblical Studies that would be adequate for RE teachers in primary schools. Because this is probably the only exposure to the study of the Bible that such RE teachers will have, the method and the selection and treatment of texts is important.

It was felt that a limited presentation – for example, one Gospel only – may be better than an attempt to cover all the material in the limited time available. An alternative approach may be to present a basic survey course that is more theological and thematic than exegetical. As long as one could encourage the teachers to read the Bible as part of such a course, this method may be a suitable way of dealing with the limitations of the situation.

A report of this type of teacher training course was then given and a number of suitable books briefly discussed: the authors only are given here – M. Link, Charpentier, D. Harrington, R.A. Spivey – D.M. Smith, Oxford Atlas of the Bible.

The meeting agreed that the Australian Church needs to be more concerned with RE training and the teaching of Scripture in schools. Perhaps the CBA needs to adopt a higher profile in this matter. The possibility that the recent exposure of Catholics to the Bible in the vernacular could result in a 'Catholic Fundamentalism' was noted.

Conclusions: The seminar proposed that:-

- a) the 1984 conference include a seminar on teaching methods, along the lines of the 1983 seminar.
- b) that a report of the 1983 seminar be circulated to members by the secretary.
- c) that members be invited by the secretary to make contributions at the 1984 seminar, or send in proposals for discussion.
- d) that the 1984 seminar devote some time to the matter of RE teacher training in the field of Biblical Studies. This could be with the training of Biblical Studies teachers and the presentation of the Bible in the classroom.

NARRATIVE:

Satisfaction was expressed by members at the opportunity of being present at both OT and NT seminars. It was decided to continue to hold the seminars separately. Several members have volunteered short presentations for 1989.

OTHER MATTERS: Broadening Membership of the CBAA

The question of opening membership to non-Catholics was raised. Already, in the course of this year's Conference, one open session was held to which members of the Fellowship of Biblical Studies were invited—the paper, "The Status of Biblical Narrative," given by Professor Stephen Prickett, Head of the Department of English at the Australian National University, Canberra. Should this partial opening to others remain the limit of our approach, or should a broader involvement be encouraged? The ensuing discussion was warm, with fairly strong views being expressed on both sides. Eventually the following motion was proposed and passed:

That we recommend to the 1989 Annual General Meeting that the process be begun of inviting to membership non-Catholic representation.

At the same time, Campion Murray acceded to a request that he prepare a position paper on the Constitution in relation to this subject, to be presented within the CBAA Annual Conference (and not simply at the Annual General Meeting). In certain areas the Constitution is in need of review and updating; accordingly, a copy is included with these Minutes, so that members may come prepared to the Conference next July.

A Bicentenary Gesture by the CBAA

It was suggested that the Presidential Address, "Australian Biblical Studies—A Catholic Contribution," be expanded and include a bibliography of books and articles by Catholic biblical scholars. Some of the CBA funds could be used to subsidize this initiative. The suggestion was favourably received and the Executive empowered to negotiate for the printing, with the proviso that the second Interest Bearing Deposit of \$1000 not be used without prior confirmation from Association members. Frank Moloney offered to discuss the project with the Paulists.

Thanks

The retiring President promised, on behalf of members of the Association, to pass on their sincere thanks for the hospitality extended them by Corpus Christi College, Clayton, and especially to those immediately concerned with our accommodation—Fr Peter Kenny, Sr Lesley Dickinson RSM, and seminarian Alan Fox. This has already been done. Michael Fitzpatrick moved a vote of thanks to Rod Doyle and David Timbs for the successful organization of this year's Conference.

B. Rod Doyle

(The outgoing Secretary, David Timbs, left for the United States some days after the Conference.)

During the meeting of the Catholic Biblical Association of Australia, held in Sydney in July 1988, the following resolution was passed:

That we recommend to the 1989 Annual General Meeting that the process be begun of inviting to membership non-Catholic representation.

I accepted to prepare a position paper on the Constitution of the Association in relation to this subject. Unfortunately I cannot be present at the next meeting but I submit the follow ing comments as a possible basis for discussion.

In August 1989 it will be 25 years since the Constitution and By-laws of the Association were approved at the General Meeting held in Sydney, 11-12 August 1964. Before examining the wording of the Constitution to see if the 1988 resolution is within the letter of the articles, it is worth while indicating how the situation in which the Association now meets is different from the situation in 1964.

i) The aims of the Association:

The aims of the Association are set out in Section 2 of Article II; they are as follows:

- (a) to promote a better mutual acquaintance among Catholic biblical scholars and to facilitate the exchange of methods and ideas
- (b) to expound the teachings of the Church regarding the Bible and to promote deeper understanding among Catholic and non-Catholic scholars
- (c) to help those who are engaged in pastoral work, in schools, or in the lay apostolate. In 1964 the staffs of seminaries were only beginning to meet together which explains the emphasis in (a). I believe the Association grew out of regional associations in Melbourne and Sydney. Possibly the first time many of the Scripture teachers met one another nationally was at the series of lectures given in Sydney by Fr Alexander Jones in about 1958. In 1964 Catholic biblical scholars did need a better mutual acquaintance; if the words a better were removed from the article the aim would remain valid.

The emphasis in (b) is not immediately evident. The sub section has two parts. The wording of the first part (to expand ... Bible) is clearly looking beyond the members of the Association. It was the time of the vernacular in the liturgy, of exploring the biblical foundations of theology, liturgy, and devotions. Before the Vatican Council the regional groups of biblical teachers had provided courses beyond the seminaries. I surmise that the first part of (b) is concerned with this desire to make the Bible more available to people.

However in the second part of (b) the people to be contacted are specified, namely, Catholic and non-Catholic scholars. Among Catholics the meetings held during the 1960's to which were invited Catholic and non-Catholic biblical scholars and theologians. With the formation of the theological association this contact changed to the forms with which we are now familiar. But from the beginning the Biblical Association did envisage a contact with non-Catholic scholars.

The aim of the third section of (c) is clear and at the time, I feel sure, was seen to be a major work of the Association. One has only to list the number of articles which refer to the Regional groups of the Association to see the importance attached to this section. It was through the Regional groups that the Association organized its activities and teaching programmes. The Regional groups are referred to in:

Article III, Section, 2 Article IV, Sections, 4, 5, 6 Article VII, Sections, 1, 2, 3 and in BY-LAW II. Today this work of teaching in the regions is in the hands of other bodies and the references to the Regional groups could perhaps be deleted from the Constitution.

There is another difference between 1964 and 1989 which has to be taken into consideration. Compared to 1964 the group of Catholic biblical scholars now has a significant number of highly qualified members who are noted for their professional publications. This means that the members of the Association today have more diverse expectations of what they can give to and receive from the Association than would have been the case in 1964.

ii) Non-Catholic membership in the Association.

A stated aim of the association is to promote deeper understanding with non-Catholic scholars. Clearly one way of doing this is to invite non-Catholics to join the Association. In fact if a non-Catholic did apply for membership it is difficult to see on what grounds the request could be refused. Article III spells out the two types of members, Active and Associate, for which the qualifications are biblical expertise and sympathy with the aims of the Association respectively. Solely in terms of the wording of the Constitution it does not seem that any objection can be made to non-Catholic membership.

The Constitution approved in 1964 served its purpose well because it dealt with the aims and work of the Association of that time. Since 1964 the aims and work of the Association, have changed and I presume that the response to the resolution from last year's meeting will be determined by how the aims of the Association are seen today and how they are to be implemented.

The aim of Catholic scholars maintaining contact with one another and learning from one another is not immediately affected by admitting non-Catholic members. Also should non-Catholics be members this would of itself seem to promote deeper understanding between Catholic and non-Catholic scholars. But since the Association as an Association does not undertake programmes of teaching the aims of the Association would now seem to be concerned almost entirely with the needs of its members.

The Association is a forum for members to present papers, to engage in workshops, and to learn from one another. The forum has to suit the members of the Association: for example, if the forum was kept exclusively on a level of scholarship beyond the expertise of some members the forum will not be useful for all; on the other hand if the level is too general the forum will not suit all. Perhaps what is needed in the preparation of the General Meetings is to ensure that there is a varied programme which will allow everyone to contribute and to learn.

In conclusion, then, I submit that the Constitution could be altered slightly to suit the aims of the Association in 1989, that non-Catholics can be admitted as members, that their membership in the Association would further the aims of the Association, and that the General Meetings be planned in such a way as to be of help to all its members.

JOHN SCULLION, S) (26/2/1925—24/11/1990)

In memoriam

John Scullion was born in North Melbourne on the 26th February, 1925, "in the shadow of the North Melbourne gasometer" as he used to say—always with a touch of pride. He was not quite seventeen when he joined the Jesuits on February 2nd, 1942, spending five years in the mundane routines of Jesuit novitiate and the application necessary for following philosophical studies taught almost entirely in Latin. A contemporary remembers him as "a neat batsman and a nippy footballer".

Four dates can be pulled out as significant stepping-stones marking the next four decades of John's life. They are: 1947, 1957, 1967, and 1977.

In 1947, he began the study of classics at the University of Melbourne. He thrived on it, taking his Bachelor's and Master's degrees with first class honours. After ten years of continuous study, he had a two-year break teaching at St. Ignatius College, Riverview. It says something for John's thoroughness that, Victorian though he was, he swotted up the rules of rugby and earned his rugby referee's badge—no mean achievement, as anyone who has done it will testify.

1957 saw his ordination to the priesthood, after four years of theology in the idyllic surroundings of Canisius College, Pymble. His mentor in Old and New Testament was Fr. Bill Dalton, freshly returned with his licentiate from the Pontifical Biblical Institute in Rome. His own theology completed, John spent three years studying for his licentiate at the Biblicum and a fourth tertianship year at Münster.

John then came back to Pymble to teach Scripture, while Bill Dalton returned to Rome for his doctoral studies. John used to say wryly, and only half-humorously, that he belonged to the last generation of students to be harried by their professors and to the first generation of professors to be harried by their students. He also belonged to the last generation of Jesuit faculty in Australia expected to be competent in both Old and New Testament. "In those days, there were giants in the land" (Gen 6:4).

In 1967, John was back at Pymble, with his own doctorate, equipped for the teaching of Old Testament. He had gone to Paris for his doctoral studies, working at the Institut Catholique under the direction of Msgr. Henri Cazelles, doyen of French exegetes at the time. His doctoral work focussed on Isaiah, with liberal application of studies in Ugaritic, hence a number of articles in <u>Ugarit Forschung</u>.

Within a couple of years, John was part of the move from Canisius College in Pymble to Jesuit Theological College in Parkville. He was one of the leading figures in the moves which brought the Jesuit theological students, and later philosophers too, into the ambit of the United Faculty of Theology. A perusal of the academic minutes and papers from that period shows just how much effort and energy John put into the pursuit of Christian unity within our local church. He was not only teaching Old Testament at UFT as well as at JTC, but he negotiated with Dr. Davis

McCaughey the establishment of the Pymble theological library at Ormond College, laying the foundations for the collaboration which has now given us the Joint Theological Library. No one familiar with that library will be unaware of the immense energy John poured into the support of the library, attending to its finances, seeking out new acquisitions, devouring new titles as they arrived.

In 1977, he became the first Roman Catholic President of the UFT. In the same year, he moved to Newman College, as scholar in residence, and made a home there in surroundings he found congenial until the end of his life.

These are the bare bones of a rich and varied life. In themselves, they tell us little of the John Scullion who was loved, admired, and revered. His work as teacher and scholar are marked by two particular qualities: clarity and tenacity. He set great store by turning complex Teutonic learning into clear and simple English prose. His lecturing style was greatly appreciated for its clarity and directness. When John had finished with a topic, students knew exactly what they were expected to know. At the same time, he was thorough and tenacious in the pursuit of academic excellence.

His early writings were significant for the ecumenism of the nascent UFT. Both his <u>The Theology of Inspiration</u> (Theology Today 10; Cork: Mercier, 1970) and his collaboration, along with with John Cowburn, Bill Daniel, and Harry Wardlaw, in the volume on <u>Original Sin</u>, were reflections of his teaching activity in the early years of the ecumenical faculty.

When the need for work of this kind lessened, John turned his linguistic skills to the task of translating major studies that were unavailable to English-language students. First and foremost among these was the massive task of rendering three volumes and over 1,800 pages of Claus Westermann's scholarly German into lucid and intelligible English. Westermann's classic work on Genesis will be read by far more students in John Scullion's English than will ever read its German original.

A renewed fire for his own work came with a warmly received commentary on Isaiah 40-66 (OT Message 12; Wilmington: Glazier, 1982; 2nd printing, 1990). Then, with his translation of the Westermann Genesis commentary completed, John turned his hand to producing his own. It is a mark of the tenacity and drive of John Scullion, battling an illness he knew to be terminal, that in the last years he pursued a number of major projects and brought seven of them to fruition during his final sabbatical year in 1989. They are worth listing briefly.

- There is his translation of Rolf Rendtorff's 1977 monograph, possibly his most significant, The Problem of the Process of Transmission in the Pentateuch, (JSOTSup 89; Sheffield: JSOT, 1990) which John received in mid-November just a couple of days before the onset of his final illness.
- ii. There is also the 2nd revised printing of his own <u>Isaiah 40-66</u>, with Michael Glazier, 1990.
- iii. Most important of all, there is his own extensive Genesis commentary, to come out at the end of this year with Michael Glazier Books, now an imprint of The Liturgical Press, Collegeville.

Catholic Biblical Association of Australia

The contribution of Fr William Dalton SJ to Biblical Scholarship.

Bill Dalton was born on the family farm near Benalla Vic. on November 8 1916. He received secondary education at Xavier College Kew, and entered the Society of Jesus in March 1934. In the course of his Jesuit studies, he taught for four years at St Louis School, Perth and graduated MA in Classical Philology from Melbourne University. After ordination in January 1949, he studied at the Pontifical Biblical Institute, Rome, taking out his Licentiate in Sacred Scripture. After a period of teaching at Canisius College, Pymble N.S.W. and Corpus Christi College, Glen Waverley Vic. he returned to Rome for doctoral studies. His thesis, a study of Christ's redemptive work as presented I Peter 3:18 - 4:6 won the highest academic grade and was published in Analecta Biblica in 1965. With this work Fr Dalton established himself as the leading Catholic expert on I Peter, a status which he has retained over a long period, contributing the commentaries in this area in such presitgious works as the New Catholic Commentary on Holy Scripture and the New Jerome Biblical Commentary.

In the 60's and 70's Fr Dalton had a far-reaching impact on the Australian Church as he promoted the rediscovered sense of Scripture that came to fruition in the Catholic Church at Vatican 11. His sound scholarship and effective teaching, the clarity and grace of his written style, his gift of encouraging and enthusing others particularly the young, the lived biblical spirituality radiating from his personality, his sense of Christianity as a religion of hope and joy rather than fear: all this made an unforgettable impression upon a whole generation of seminarians, religious and lay-people, who attended lectures, workshops and retreats conducted by him throughout Australia. This has also been a feature of his work in the United States, where at several periods during his scholarly career, he has been a visiting professor in colleges and seminaries.

From the start Bill Dalton's teaching was warmly ecumenical in tone. His wide personal friendships with scholars and leaders of other churches played an essential role in the successful transfer, under his leadership, of Jesuit Theological College to Parkville, Melbourne where it became part of the unique ecumenical venture that is the United Faculty of Theology.

Upon completion of his rectorship at Jesuit Theological College, Fr Dalton, became a professor and superior of the community at the Pontifical Biblical Institute, Rome, followed by a similar role at the Institute in Jerusalem. During these years he developed close relationships with Jewish scholars and a keen desire to promote a sound understanding of Judaism amongst Christians has been a hallmark of his more recent teaching and writing.

The years immediately preceding his retirement have been spent in teaching at Catholic Theological College, Clayton.

Fr Bill Dalton belongs to that great generation of native-born scholars who, often at some cost, pioneered in the early post-Second World War years the fresh and liberating understanding of the faith that was to culminate at Vatican 11. Unlike some pioneers, he has never been overtaken by those he led early on. His spirit of hope and his gift for encouragement have remained constant throughout the years, as has also his ability to challenge and inspire new generations. Greatly gifted by God, Bill Dalton has liberally placed his gifts at the service of others that service that has been abundantly fruitful and that service we now honour.

The text of the President's address is enclosed. The Minutes of the 1991 AGM were accepted.

Business Arising from the Minutes:

(1) <u>Bishops' Conference 4 December 1991.</u> Dr Sue Boorer reported on her presentation regarding the development of the biblical canon. This was part of the 4 December 1991 bishops' conference pastoral discussion, 'The Role of the Theologian in the Mission of the Church'. A letter of appreciation from Bishop Heather was read. Discussion then followed on the value of interdisciplinary discussion on topics such as revelation, inspiration, tradition and the magisterium. This was followed by a proposal for the foundation of an Academy of Religion as one way of providing for collaboration between bible and theology.

Action Taken: In view of the invitation to further collaboration in Bishop Heather's letter, and concern felt that the CBAA should be proactive in countering attacks on scholars, a sub-committee was formed (Joe Sobb, Michael Trainor and Campion Murray). This committee will work to establish with the bishops some strategy to be followed.

(2) <u>Concern re the lectionary</u>. A reply was read from Fr Ellich on possible translation for use in the liturgy. The feeling of the meeting was that anxieties about the selection of texts and the use of the most satisfactory translation had not been addressed. A special concern was that biblicists, not just liturgists, decide on the lectionary, with input from other worshippers. Present difficulties with selections were noted.

Action Taken: Elaine Wainwright offered to talk to Fr Ellich and continue discussions

with Mark Coleridge,

<u>Proposals:</u> That more time be allowed at CBAA meetings for discussion of matters contained in reports; that abstracts of reports be distributed with the Agenda before meetings; that the question of forming an Academy of Religion be discussed next year.

1993 CBAA Conference

- 1) The proposed 90 minute joint Session onhermeneutics with ACTA was reaffirmed, though the time allowed appeared too brief. One proposal was to allow another time slot at the CBAA Conference for discussion of what arose from the combined session. Volunteers for CBAA's contribution: Mark Coleridge and Sue Boorer. Suggesions: That the historical segment of each paper (on the total paper) be distributed beforehand to allow more time for discussion of central issues.
- 2) Continuing Seminars. The first suggestions made for topics were Mt 2 and the midwives in Ex I and 2 as continuing texts of terror to be treated from a feminist perspective. They were not decided on, so Rom Barry accepted responsibility for co-ordinating a seminar in OT and Tony Corcoran in NT.
- 3) Other topics proposed. Members should be free to offer to work on any area of interest. Reader-response and post-modernist methods should be included. John Hill offered a presentation in Jer 25. Some members wanted the opportunity to attend both OT and NT sessions. Could there be more discussion on the freedom of the biblical theologian? on the relationship of the biblical theologian and the magisterium? on the lectionary? Could one session be set aside for such practical issues? Could Bishop Heather be invited?

The Cardinal opened the meeting with prayer and welcomed all present. Bishop Heather was invited to chair the meeting. After explaining the goals of the meeting he invited each Association to contribute in turn. In each case general discussion followed.

The Catholic Biblical Association of Australia

Members of the Association are pleased to be involved in efforts to teach the faith. Many are involved in adult education at many levels.

Biblical scholarship is moving very quickly. Members would like to share it in the community of the Church.

About one half of the members of the Association are women.

Hermeneutics is one of the key areas of scholarship at present (in other theological disciplines too). People can be "oppressed by the biblical text". More effort is needed to allow people to be enlivened by the Scriptures.

Homilies were discussed. Priests need encouragement and help. Many are afraid of setting out into unknown territory. The continuing education of the clergy needs emphasis.

Biblical scholarship (like the pharmacist's knowledge) is a safeguard against mistakes that can be disastrous.

The Moral Theology Association of Australia and New Zealand

1. A protocol of fair play is needed when a theologian is under fire. The fall-out can be more damaging than the original problem. In any protocol the total context needs to be considered.

The ACBC approved a few years ago the beginning of a protocol available in the Church in Australia. This to be made available to Associations.

The conversation on this subject to continue.

- 2. As above, members are ready to help in adult education in faith.
- 3. A case from the Plunkett Centre. There is a need for canonists and moral theologians to get together. Catholic identity needs to be safeguarded. "An organic unity between gospel and culture". An AD HOC group of consultants is needed to deal with particular issues.
- 4. Access to Eucharistic communion of persons canonically excluded "bishops need to take up with Holy See".
- 5. Recent publicity re sexual abuse. There needs to be much better formation for celibacy than was provided in the past. Victims need to be heard; so do alleged perpetrators.
- 6. The Bishops' Committee, in reply to an earlier observation, had suggested that the Associations themselves set up the requested inter-disciplinary task force on the ministry of women in the Church. It was suggested there was value in the bishops being seen to initiate this process. There are also difficulties.

The Australian Catholic Theological Association

The 1993 meeting was the best ever. A certain theological culture has developed. The topics were Hermeneutics and Contextualized Theology. There was a joint meeting with the Biblical Association. The topic next year will be Evangelisation.

Discussion turned to the Catechism of the Catholic Church.

- * People need to be in-serviced. Some sections (Original Sin, Angels) provide normative resources but could be interpreted in a fundamentalist way.
- Teachers have fears about the Catechism. Their fears need to be tackled by in-service through the Education Offices. It needs to be stressed that this is not a catechism in the usual sense in which that word is used. Some statement for authorities in R.E. is desirable perhaps that could coincide with launching.

There should be some forum in which theologians can "fly kites" with peers without fear of publicity or rebuke from elsewhere - hence importance of fellowships, associations etc.

His Eminence at the conclusion thanked all and anticipated a meeting in 1994.

Extract from the Minutes of the ACBA Nov/Dec 1988

PROCEDURES TO SAFEGUARD ORTHODOXY WITH IT IS QUESTIONED.

A submission from the Australian Catholic Theological Association had proposed that complaints regarding the orthodoxy of theological writings within Australia should be addressed initially by some structure within Australia. In dealing with this proposal the Committee had been conscious that it is the right of the diocesan bishop to deal with complaints against one of his sub3ects, and that the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith has special competence in this area.

MOTION: 1 That Conference constitute a

Committee as an advisory body to which a bishop may r6fer challenges

to orthodoxy in his diocese.

MOTION: 2 That the Committee in carrying out this responsibility in

theparticular case may seek expert and competent help from

consultants.

BISHOP BEDE HEATHER

I also wrote a letter of explanation accompanying the letter which came out of our conference concerning the Apostolic Letter of John Paul II on reserving priestly ordination to men alone.

Bishop Bede has replied:

The Apostolic Letter of the Pope on reserving priestly ordination to men alone has been the subject of discussion among a number of Church members engaged in theological dialogue and research. I appreciate the attention given to this matter by the Catholic Biblical Association. I am pleased to note, as I would expect, that the Association acknowledges the authority of the Letter.

The press release seems to me to have reflection well this last point above, as well as the legitimate concerns of your members as biblical scholars. I note that ministry in the New Testament, especially that of women, will be the focus of next year's conference, and I hope I shall be able to attend.

Meanwhile, I am grateful for the letter directed to me and to my fellow members on the Committee for Doctrine and Morals. It will be a subject for our consideration when next we meet. I note the limitations within which it is being presented at this time. It will be valuable to the Committee, and I hope, to the Bishops of Australia, when the matter is more fully researched and presented.

MORE ON THAT LETTER

The press statement arising out of our annual general meeting found its way into a few Catholic papers, including the Catholic Weekly (completely), the Catholic Leader (with the first part missing!) and AD 2000 (complete with my name and address!) I have received a couple of letters criticising us. The Marist Mission Centre has also had a few people withdrawing their contributions because of the "disloyalty" of one of the Marist Fathers.



The Catholic Biblical Association of Australia met for its Annual Meeting (July 1-4) at Corpus Christi College, Clayton, Victoria. Amongst other matters, the recent Apostolic Letter of Pope John Paul II, "On Reserving Priestly Ordination to Men Alone," was discussed. While acknowledging the authority of the Letter, the members of the Association expressed disquiet, as biblical scholars, at the way Scripture is used in this document. It was recommended, therefore, that further studies be undertaken to build on the significant biblical research already available in relation to ministry in the New Testament, especially women's ministry. The 1995 Meeting of this Association intends to take up this matter.

Minutes of Annual General Meeting Saturday 2 July 1994 Corpus Christi College, Clayton Victoria

- 1. Opening Prayer: the president, Br Rod Doyle.
- 2. Apologies: Sr Sheila Byrne, Frs Tony Campbell, Mark Coleridge, Sr Antoinette Collins, Frs Jerome Crowe, Michael Fallon, Michael FitzPatrick, Sr Majella Franzmann, Fr Wim Hoekstra, Sr. Mary Reaburn, Alice Sinnott.
- 3. Minutes of previous meeting read and accepted (Fr Michael Trainor & Ian Sanders).

4. Matters arising:

- [i] Report of sub-committee to consider methods of dealing with attacks on biblical scholars presented by Fr Michael Trainor:- members of the sub-committee did not meet, since there is now a process set up by the Bishops' Conference which allows scholars to work in collaboration with the Bishops and theologians to deal with investigations.
- [ii] the proposed new lectionary: Fr Mark Coleridge was charged with carrying this matter forward. He was then sent to an international meeting on English in the liturgy. Bishop Bede Heather has asked Fr John McSweeney to gather reviews on the NRSV as the text of the new lectionary. As no other changes are envisaged, the lectionary will be like Canada's. Fr Michael Trainor reminded the meeting that last year's AGM believed that Bishops should be advised that there was a need, for various reasons, to alter the 3-year cycle of readings. The president was asked to remind Fr Mark Coleridge of the urgency of this task.
- [iii] Sub-committee to organise the 1994 CBAA Conference: this did not meet for various reasons. The meeting then reviewed the reasons for establishing the sub-committee, namely to lessen the load on the executive, to involve members outside Sydney and Melbourne in the planning, and to allow for different structures and more creative planning.
- [iv] The treasurer requested that each member fill in the CBAA information sheet for the database, in view of changes and updating of records needed.
- 5. Correspondence. Most dealt with apologies, requests concerning the timing of Conferences, and suggestions concerning format etc. Fr Jerome Crowe asked for more conjoint meetings with other national bodies such as AASR; Sr Majella Franzmann proposed

dovetailing of CBAA, AASR and ANZATS Conferences; Fr Tony Campbell suggested invited major papers along with research reports in parallel sessions allowing choice to participants.

6. 1995 Conference.

[i] Time and place: Discussion centred on whether to join with ANZATS and AASR, 24-28 September 1995 in Canberra. There was general agreement that CBAA needs to keep its identity, but still be open to wider questions in our culture. To have its own papers before or after ANZATS /AASR would not always be the best policy. Most wanted to continue the association with ACTA. Many recognized the links with ANSATS /AASR as particularly valuable to women scholars and those involved in crossover areas, even granted there are other means of contact apart from common Conferences. Another strong view was that in timing our Conference, we do not compete with other Conferences. Adelaide and Brisbane could again be considered as venues. A possibility would be to have the CBAA Conference in the same city as the ANSATS /AASR if ACTA does the same.

The general drift of the discussion was that for 1995 we meet at the same time as ACTA, but that the executive of CBAA enter into dialogue with other others as well with a view to exploring collaboration.

Motion: The executive of the CBAA enter into discussion with these organisations for 1996 and then circulate CBAA members concerning possibilities in order to make a decision. (Fr Joe Sobb & Sr Elaine Wainwright). Passed.

[ii] Format: ideas included - invited major papers (not generally supported); research reports or projects (widely supported, especially if the papers were brief and helped to update members in various areas of Scripture scholarshi p); continuing ongoing seminars (widely supported).

It wassuggested that seminars could cater for as few as two or three, that is, that two or more seminars could run concurrently; freedom to attend ACTA sessions and vice versa, over and above joint sessions; to have 20-minutes' papers so as to leave more time for questions, discussion, organised response, a forum; to recognize the centenary of the appearance of The Woman's Bible; to have early meetings between the executives of CBAA and ACTA so as to plan to implement common themes agreed upon (eg. evangelisation hermeneutics), to make contact with speakers and obtain resumés of their papers. In the light of the correspondence received and of this discussion, it was generally agreed that the CBAA executive with two or three others form an organizing sub-committee, to take early action with ACTA to plan for the 1995 Conference.

As finance are in a healthy condition, Fr Joe Sobb proposed

- [i] a larger refund (35%) instead of the current 20% be offered to members from Adelaide, Brisbane, Perth, New Zealand, whose travelling costs are not subsidised, with a suitable "ceiling" for total disbursements;
- [ii] he be authorized to put aside surplus monies from the current account into a fixed-term deposit;
- [iii] the subscription remain at the present rate of \$20.00. Sr Veronica Lawson seconded these proposals which, after a short discussion, were passed.

10 Other business:

- [i] the suggestion was made that the positions of secretary and treasurer be combined. This would be tried for a period.
- [ii] some members wanted CBAA to make a response to the recent letter of the Pope John Paul II on the ordination of women. Dear Bishop

We, the members of the Catholic Biblical Association of Australia, gathered at our annual meeting (July 1-4) at Corpus Christi College, Clayton, Vic., write to you in connection with the recent promulgation of the Apostolic Letter of Pope John Paul II, "On Reserving Priestly Ordination to Men Alone" (May 22, 1994). While acknowledging the authority of this document, we wish to communicate the disquiet that we as biblical scholars have experienced at the way scripture is used in this document to the end of showing that the Church lacks the authority to admit women to the priesthood.

The central scriptural argument employed (§ 2) appears to flow from the choice of Christ in choosing as apostles twelve men. The document rightly insists upon the solemnity with which the gospels surround this choice on the part of Jesus and also upon the fact that he gave every evidence of being capable of choosing and acting contrary to the culture of his time. However, the argument adduced fails to take cognizance of the symbolic nature of Jesus' choice of the Twelve, in which they were to constitute the foundation of the eschatological Israel, representing the original twelve tribes. It seems clear that in the on-going life of the Church following the death and resurrection of Jesus, the Twelve as such ceased to have great relevance and that, under the guiding influence of the Spirit, the concept of apostleship underwent considerable development. Amongst those whom Paul greets in his letter to the Christians of Rome, is one Junia, who he dubs as "outstanding among the apostles" (Rom 16:7). On linguistic grounds, it is clear that the person named as "outstanding apostles" by Paul is a woman, as St. John Chrysostom, amongst others, was glad to acknowledge. This would suggest that the concept of apostleship was not necessarily confined to men in the early generations of the church.

Careful reading of the New Testament, in fact, suggests that Jesus himself in his earthly life did not establish fixed patterns of ministry to act as a blueprint for the later church. Rather, as the gospel itself indicates (John 16:12-13), church structures evolved in the early post -Easter church under the influence of the guiding Spirit of Jesus and as a discerned response to the needs of the situation. This is in no sense to deny that the institution of such structures occurred, as the Church has taught, (lure divino), since they emerged, through the influence of the Spirit at the formative time of the church. However, it does imply that appeals to the mind or will of the historical Jesus to defend the fixity of certain patterns of ministry lack credibility. In particular, it can be argued that the determination that major church office should rest solely upon male members of the Church reflects more the social conditions and necessities of the time (need to survive in the patriarchal society of late first century C. E. Greco-Roman culture); it need not necessarily be tied up with an unchangeable divine disposition, especially at a time when the social conditions - notably the relations between men and women - are significantly different. In fact, scripture scholars have been able to point to other strands of the New Testament (e.g., Gal 3:28) which seem to attest that in the earliest period a great measure of equality prevailed, an equality which, in the prevailing social conditions, is difficult to explain save as a consequence of a powerful impulse given by Jesus himself. In fact, it can very plausibly be argued that the will of Jesus is that in his community a

complete equality of women and men should prevail. The task - and opportunity - of the Church, in fidelity to the Master, is surely to recapture and express in its structures, that equality in every way possible.

The document argues (§ 3) that the fact that Mary, the Mother of Jesus, received "neither the mission proper to the Apostles nor the ministerial priesthood" shows that the non-admission of women to priestly ordination cannot mean that women are of lesser dignity. With respect, we would respond that this argument is far from convincing. At the time of Jesus' death Mary, his mother, must have been at least in her mid-forties. Granted the social conditions and life-expectancy of the age, comparable to conditions in many countries of the developing world today, it is hardly conceivable that Mary at her age could have looked forward a viable "apostolic career". There were, therefore, other considerations, apart from her womanhood, inhibiting the appointment of Mary to apostolic office. The argument from the non-ordination of Mary is, therefore, a nonsequitur, which we feel ought be abandoned.

We also recall that the Pontifical Biblical Commission, when asked to respond to the question of women's ordination, after a two-year examination of the question, responded in April 1977, by a vote of 17-0, that the New Testament does not settle the question in a clear way, once for all, and, by a further vote of 12-5, that neither Scripture nor Christ's plan alone excluded the possibility (cf. New Jerome Biblical Commentary Ch 72:38 [pp. 1173-74]). The Commission has not subsequently rescinded the response then made. We are puzzled that the document appears to neglect the advice given by those constituted to advise the Church on weighty matters of scripture.

These and other considerations suggest, to our mind, that, in its scriptural aspects at least, the whole question of the ordination of women and the participation of women in roles suggesting equal, rather than subordinate dignity within the church, is far from concluded. In particular, it would seem that, if the Church is to consider woman debarred from eucharistic leadership, it is incumbent upon church authorities to find some way to enable them to exercise leadership within the community truly reflective of their equal dignity.



- from the President

1995 CONFERENCE: MANLY

With this newsletter you will receive a call for papers to be presented at the 1995 Conference which will be held at St Patrick's College, 151 Darley Road, Manly, from the evening of Friday 7 July to the afternoon of Monday 10 July. The focus of the Conference is *Ministry and Public Service in Old and New Testaments*. At the same time and venue, ACTA will be addressing the present state of theological investigation into the ordination of women and the magisterial status of the Pope's apostolic letter. We are seeking to coordinate our programme closely with that of ACTA.

USE OF NRSV FOR LITURGICAL &CATECHETICAL PURPOSES

Probably by now you are all aware of the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith's rejection of the NRSV for use in the liturgy and catechetics. This has led to the Congregation for Divine Worship indicating that approval cannot be given to lectionaries which use that translation. No reasons have been given for the decision. Cuthbert Johnson, of the English desk of the Worship Congregation, has been reported as saying that it was the debate over the Catechism which saw "doctrinal questions emerge about the NRSV" which changed the climate regarding this translation.

MEETING WITH THE BISHOPS' COMMITTEE

The CBAA executive, Joe Sobb, Pamela Foulkes, and myself, together with representatives of ACTA and the moral theologians, met with the Committee for Doctrine and Morals of the Australian Bishops' Conference at Kensington on Monday 28 November for 2 hours. The committee is made up of Bishop Jim Cuskelly (convenor) who liaises with ACTA, Bishop Geoff Robinson who liaises with the moral theologians, and Bishop Bede Heather who is our liaison. The meeting went well. We raised two matters:

- i) The ongoing biblical formation of those involved in preaching, particularly the clergy. We took the opportunity to inform the bishops of what we have discussed at the last two AGM's (at least), that our members are keen to assist the local churches in this regard.
- ii) The ban of the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith on the NRSV for use in liturgy and catechetics. We expressed our dismay and pointed out the disturbing implications of the decision, liturgically, ecumenically, and theologically. We learnt from the bishops that the Australian Bishops had sought approval from the Congregation for Divine Worship for a number of versions to be used in the liturgy. The Congregation replied that it approves "lectionaries" not versions. Moreover, the Congregation could not accept the use of the NRSV in a lectionary because it had been rejected for use in the liturgy and catechetics by a higher authority. It did not give any reasons for the rejection, apparently neither has the Congregation for the Doctrine of the

Faith. The bishops have encouraged us to write to Rome ourselves.

A related matter was discussed: a revision of the Lectionary, also raised at previous AGM's. A general dissatisfaction was expressed with the present structure of the lectionary (even though the Congregation for Divine Worship believes it has solved all its problems there). The bishops suggest the CBAA present some principles to work by, suggestions and examples for a revised lectionary.

Outcomes from the meeting directly affecting the CBAA were:

- i) The ACTA study on the ordination of women: the bishops urged us to collaborate with ACTA in the study document. An interim report is expected to be presented to the Bishops' Committee in May.
- ii) The future of theological endeavour in the Australian Church: the three associations are to provide information on the career paths available especially to lay graduates, their needs, challenges, and the difficulties they face.
- iii) Theologians accused of heretical teaching: the Australian bishops have sought that such cases be first investigated within the Australian Church, rather than being first taken up by the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith. They wish to set up policies and procedures which will be equitable for all parties concerned. The bishops have asked the three associations to nominate a representative to a committee whose task will be to draft a process to be submitted to the Bishops' Committee.

The new arrangement of having a committee of three bishops, each of whom has a particular connection with each of the three associations is a most welcome development. Each of the bishops hopes to participate fully in the annual conferences of their respective association. It is expected that the bishop will have a timeslot programmed into the conference. At other times, they will be in contact whenever there is need.

EXECUTIVE MEETING

he executive took the opportunity of Pamela's being in Sydney to have a meeting over lunch after the Kensington meeting. We discussed the outcomes of the meeting with the bishops, and planned our responses as much as we could. The results of our meeting are either reflected in other matters in the accompanying correspondence, or are dependent on further negotiations, about which you will be informed soon (I hope.)

NOMINATION FOR MEMBERSHIP

Charles Hill has recommended Elizabeth Fletcher. She has a BA and DipEd from the University of Sydney, a GradDip in religious studies from the University of South Australia, and is pursuing an MTheol at the University of Sydney with Bill Jobling. Much of her working life has been dedicated to a more rigorous approach to Religious Education in secondary schools with a strong emphasis on the study of Scripture. She presently works in the CEO of the Sydney Archdiocese.

Your Eminence:

At the direction of the Executive Board of the Catholic Biblical Association of America, I convey to you the following resolution:

WHEREAS approval of the revised Psalter of the New American Bible and of the New Revised Standard Version for liturgical use, given by the National Council of Catholic Bishops of the United States and confirmed by the Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments, has been revoked by the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith,

AND WHEREAS approval of the Mass lectionary, likewise approved by the National Council of Catholic Bishops of the United States, incorporating the New American Bible translation, has been held up in Rome for more than three years,

AND WHEREAS no public explanation has been given of the Congregation's objections to any of these works,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Executive Board of the Catholic Biblical Association of America respectfully and urgently requests the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith a) to make public the criteria on which its judgments concerning the suitability of biblical translations are based, including those designed for use in the liturgy; and b) that, in accord with the mandate of the Motu Proprio of His Holiness Pope Paul VI of June 27, 1971, no. 13, that "the commission must be consulted before the issuance of new norms on biblical matters," these criteria be submitted to the Pontifical Biblical Commission for their conformity with Roman Catholic Church directives over the last five decades, most recently embodied in The Interpretation of the Bible in the Church, issued by the Pontifical Biblical Commission;

FINALLY, inasmuch as criteria imposed by the Congregation for the Doctrine of

the Faith impinge on biblical translations in all languages, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that all other Catholic biblical associations throughout the world be invited to join themselves with this resolution of the Catholic Biblical Association of America in calling upon the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith for the publication of whatever criteria are being applied in judging biblical translations.

(2) For 22, Against 1.

(3) For 16, Against 5, Abstain 2.

The Whole Motion: For 18, Against 1, Abstain 4.

John Wilkinson requested that his name be recorded as Against.

ii Fr Joseph Jensen, OSB, Executive Secretary of the Catholic Biblical Association of America has written to the Secretary inviting us to join them in a letter of request to Cardinal Ratzinger calling on the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith to make public the criteria it is using to evaluate biblical translations and to submit them to the Pontifical Biblical Commission for evaluation. The text of the resolution of the Catholic Biblical Association of America (attached) had been previously circulated to members. It was unanimously agreed that the Catholic Biblical Association of Australia join with the resolution of the Catholic Biblical Association of America., and that the Archbishop of Sydney, as chair of the Australian Catholic Bishops' Conference, and the Apostolic Pro-Nuncio, be notified. It was further agreed that we keep alive the conversation on this matter.


ii In esteem and gratitude, the Meeting sent special greetings to Bill Dalton and Michael Fitzpatrick.

RESOLUTION TO BISHOPS' CONFERENCE

The resolution passed at the 1995 Annual General Meeting, regarding the exclusion of women from the ordained priesthood, has been sent to Cardinal Clancy, president of the Australian Bishop's Conference, together with a copy of the paper entitled "Arguments For and Against the Ordination of Women: A scriptural Perspective" by Sr Elaine Wainwright, presented to the joint meeting of the CBAA and ACTA. For the information of those who were not at the AGM, the text of the resolution can be found in the Minutes.

LETTER TO CARDINAL RATZINGER

As agreed at the AGM, in response to a request from the Catholic Biblical Association of America, a letter has been sent to Cardinal Ratzinger in support of their request for the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith to make public the criteria it is using to evaluate biblical translations, and to submit them to the Pontifical Biblical Commission for its evaluation. Copies of the letter have been sent to Cardinal Clancy and the Apostolic Pro-Nuncio.

8 Reports

9 Special business

i. Membership criteria and nomination requirements.

The questions posed were: Who may join the CBA? Who may attend the CBA Annual Conference? Who may give papers at the Conference? Much discussion ensued, following which the criteria of membership were expressed in terms of academic qualifications and/or professional

Constitution

Article I

The full name of this Association shall be

The Australian Catholic Biblical Association.

Article II

Purpose

Section 1

The general aim of this Association shall be to promote scholarly study of the Bible in accordance with the spirit and instructions of the Church.

Section 2

The special aims of this Association shall be

- a) to provide for mutual acquaintance and support and to facilitate the exchange of methods and ideas
- b) to constitute a body of informed opinion on matters biblical as a resource for the wider Church.

Article III

Membership

Section 1

The membership of this Association shall consist of Active members and Associate members. All members shall pay the same dues, and all shall enjoy the same rights and privileges except where the constitutions of the Association shall provide otherwise.

Section 2

Only active members shall exercise active and passive voice.

Section 3

Candidates for active membership must have an appropriate degree in biblical studies (at least at the level of Master or Licentiate), or must have equivalent professional competence in the area of biblical studies, demonstrated by the holding of an academic posting or by publication at an academic level.

Section 4

Any person or group in sympathy with the aims of the Association may duly be admitted to associate membership.

Section 5

The Annual General Meeting may confer Honorary Membership of the Association.

Section 6

Attendance at the annual conference shall be limited to active and associate members, and to guests invited by active members with the concurrence of the President. Papers at the annual conference shall be presented by active members only, or by others invited to do so by the Executive.

Section 7

Candidates for active or associate membership are proposed by an active member, who shall send the candidates's *curriculum vitae* to the Secretary at least three months before the Annual General Meeting. On the basis of material received, the Executive shall present a list of proposed new members, with relevant information concerning each, to the membership two months prior to the Annual General Meeting which will decide upon the election of new members.

Article IV

Administration

Section 1

The ultimate authority in this Association shall reside in the Active Members duly assembled in General Meeting. General Meetings are normally held annually.

Section 2

Between General Meetings, this Association shall be governed by an Executive Board consisting of a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary, a Treasurer, and, whenever so elected, an Editor.

Section 3 Executive Board

The shall meet at least at the time of the General Meeting. The President may call meetings at other times during the year.

Section 4

The fees paid by the Members shall be administered by the Board of this Association.

Article V

Duties of the Officers

Section 1

The duties of the President shall be

- a) to act as chief executive officer of this Association
- b) to preside at the General Meeting and at meetings of the Executive
- c) to represent the Association in an official capacity.

Section 2

The duties of the Vice-President shall be

- a) to assist the President
- b) to act as substitute for the President in the latter's absence from the General Meeting or from a meeting of the Executive.

Section 3

The duties of the Secretary shall be

- a) to record the Minutes of the Meetings of the Executive and to keep the records and papers of this Association
- b) to conduct the correspondence and ordinary administrative affairs of the Association according to the instructions of the Executive
- c) to issue official communications to Members at the the direction of the President
- d) to record the Minutes of General Meetings.

Section 4

The duties of the Treasurer shall be

- a) to receive the funds of this Association and to make disbursements as provided for by the Executive or by the Members in General Meeting
- b) to act as business manager of the periodical publications of the Association
- c) to submit to General Meetings a financial statement of the income and expenses of the Association
- d) to submit on request a financial statement to the Executive.

Section 5

Should an Editor be elected, the duties of the Editor shall be

a) to prepare for publication anything so approved by the General Meeting of the Association.

Article VI

Election of Officers

Section 1

The President, Vice-President, Secretary, and/or Treasurer, and Editor shall be elected by secret ballot at the Annual General Meeting.

Section 2

Terms of office shall extend from the end of the Annual General Meeting of election until the end of the next Annual General Meeting; the Secretary, and/or Treasurer, however, shall be elected for a three-year term. The President and Vice-President shall be ineligible for immediate re-election to their respective offices.

Section 3

Candidates for election to the Executive shall be proposed by two active members, who shall hand a written nomination to the Secretary in time for the nomination to be made known to the membership 24 hours before the Annual General Meeting.

Article VII

Constitution

Section 1

The Constitution of the Association is approved by the General Meeting. If necessary, the Executive may interpret articles of the Constitution between General Meetings.

Angelo O'Hagan has resigned due to overseas and other commitments: Proposed by Brendan Byrne, seconded by Rom Barry, 'That Angelo O'Hagan be elected to Honorary Life Membership'. Proposal unanimously approved; letter to be sent by incoming president.

[Noted that apologies for the conference were received from candidates Anna Grant-Henderson, Rod Letchford, Tim Meadowcroft.]

4 - Personal

Margaret Beirne has finished writing her doctoral thesis.

Brendan Byrne has been elected to membership of FAHA (Fellow Australian Humanities Association) John McSweeney is now a parish priest and teaching biblical studies part-time.

5 - Minutes of Previous Meeting

Item 10: Dates should be: 6 July, 9 July.

With these corrections: 'That minutes be accepted as true record': Moved by J McSweeney Seconded by Ian Sanders. Unanimous approval. Minutes signed by chairman.

6 - Matters Arising from the Minutes

- # Concern expressed re the need to arrive at some common themes with ACTA conference.

 This matter to be the subject of further discussion between both executives, with emphasis on the link between biblical and theological studies.
- # The bishops' document on Faith and Morals has now been published.
- # The report, "Woman and Man: On in Christ Jesus" has been published and needs discussion.
- # Format of ACBA conference should allow more time for in-depth discussions and dialogue rather than being all papers with little discussion time, therefore:
 - a) The ACBA and ACTA executives to liaise on the possibility of a joint session (possibly half a day) on a common agreed topic, with input from scripture and

theology presenters, and a plenary session.

- b) Agreed joint topic would be circularised to members of both associations, and some reading, or indication of reading, given so that all members could prepare beforehand.
- c) Process to be citically evaluated.
- # Circulating papers before conference? No, but possible Web site; M. Coloe will investigate.
- # Worship ritual to start each morning: Successfully launched during this conference.

7 - Correspondence

Letters of apology received, including one from Bishop Bede Heather in which he commented on the interesting advances in Biblical scholarship over the past few years, and noting his acknowledgment of the place which ACBA held in supporting Catholic Biblical scholarship within Australia.

8 - Election of New Members

A resolution was proposed by Brendan Byrne, seconded by John McSweeney: "That persons making the nominations shall speak to the nominations in person at the annual General Meeting, or, they shall provide substantial written recommendations." Discussion on this proposal indicated that a detailed C.V. would constitute substantial written recommendation. The resolution was approved.

The following were elected to active membership, nominations having been received as per the Constitution:

- # Thomas Rouse: Proposed Rom Barry, seconded John Hill: Approved.
- # Clare Sciesinski PVBM: Proposed J. Hill, seconded Brendan Byrne: Approved.

The nomination of Roderick Letchford was deferred in view of the resolution adopted, the absence of a detailed CV and of nominators to speak to the nomination. A warm invitation is to be extended to him to attend the next meeting. It was noted that he is continuing work towards his Doctorate.

9 - Treasurer's Report

The Treasurer's Report had been circulated to all members prior to the meeting. The treasurer brought members' attention to the following matters:

- # The financial statement now only went up to June 6th.. This avoided extra bank charges incurred in obtaining an interim statement prior to the conference. **Agreed this was acceptable**.
 - # Current membership is 70, of whom only 35 are currently financial.
- # The very low interest rate on our IBD, 1.4%, is of concern. Permission requested to liaise with bank near maturity date to obtain a better rate. **Approved**.
- # Due to rising costs: A request for conference expenses levy increase from \$15 to \$20: Moved: Ian Sanders, Seconded John McSweeney. Motion carried. Discussion on the report centred on the possible need to become an Incorporated Association, a topic raised by Mary Coloe who had concerns that the Executive members could be at risk of litigation actions against themselves, rather than ACBA itself, should such an unfortunate situation occur. Proposed by Mary Coloe, Seconded by Jamie McLaren "That the executive of ACBA investigate if ACBA should be incorporated, and if so, the mechanism to achieve this status": Approved. Results of these investigations will be presented to the next AGM.

Proposed by Mary Coloe, seconded by Ian Sanders, "That the treasurer's report be accepted". Approved.

10 -Special Business

A request that information regarding candidates for possible election be sent to members before the meeting. Noted that brief details had been given to all members attending the conference in their conference envelopes, and full details are tabled at the AGM. A full CV for one candidate had covered eight pages. To circulate this amount of information, for several candidates, to all members, was not really practical. Emphasised again that we should ask for detailed C.V.'s. Then try to circulate summarised information prior to meeting.

Proposed by Jamie McLaren, seconded by Marie Turner, "That the nominator of a candidate be present at the AGM to speak about the candidate, or provide a <u>detailed</u> letter of support if unable to attend; this requirement to be in addition to those already present in the Constitution." Approved.

John Hill raised his concerns regarding the translation of the Bible into Auslan. He has been supposed to be involved but has been gradually excluded, Mary Coloe had been approached, but nothing had eventuated. He was concerned that the translation team was becoming heavily evangelical in composition, and that the Catholic view was not being allowed into the project. The translation is supposed to cater for all views. Questioning elicited that no other members had been approached. John Hill will himself be writing to the team about his concerns; he raised the issue to alert us to the problem. ACBA should not act at present.

11 - General Business

Possibility of financial support for retired members (not now receiving remuneration for further work), to attend the annual conference was discussed. Agreed that, initially, one person per year could be assisted in this manner. The invitee to be decided by the executive, but that for the coming year an invitation be extended to Bishop Bede Heather. It would be useful to find the number of people in this category.

The secretary/treasurer raised the need for a standby person to be available should the secretary/treasurer be unable to finalise conference arrangements, or attend the conference, due to ill health or other personal/family crises. The person should preferably be in the same city to enable swift transfer of paper work etc. Margaret Beirne volunteered to cover Freda Webb.

12 - Conference Venue for 2001

A provisional booking has been made at St. Vincent's College, Potts Point, Sydney, from Thursday July 5th to Sunday July 8th 2001, for ACBA and ACTA. Concern was expressed in 1999 about the very high cost for non-resident delegates whose total costs were \$10 more than those of full board and lodging delegates. This matter is to be investigated and then discussed with ACTA: For action by the secretary/treasurer.

13 - Election to the Executive

One nomination for each position of President and Vice-President was received. **Brian Boyle**, nominated Freda Webb, seconded John McSweeney, elected President by acclamation.

Bernadette Kiley, nominated Mary Coloe, seconded Margaret Beirne, elected as Vice-President by acclamation.

14- Conclusion

The new President thanked the secretary/treasurer for her work in organising the conference. He then closed the meeting with prayer.

- d) Srs. Mary Coloe and Elaine Wainwright contributed essays to "That Our Joy May Be Complete".

5 - Minutes of Year 2000 A.G.M.

"The minutes be accepted as a true record": Proposed - Ian Sanders, Seconded - Charles Hill.

Approved unanimously and signed as a true record by the president.

6 - Matters arising from the minutes:

- a) Joint half-day session with ACTA: Organised by both executives. Well structured and addressed key issues clearly. F/U to be organised by the two presidents.
- b) ACBA sessions allowing more discussion time: Felt to be very successful; the one and a half hour allocations provided time for less rushed papers, and more in depth discussions than previously. Perhaps some time needs to be allocated next year for brief reports of work in progress.
- c) Incorporation: The President reported that discussions with legal colleagues had indicated we should not, at present, pursue this option as personal cover from litigation for executive members was not automatic, and executive members would have to obtain their own personal cover. There is

hope that the government may tighten up incorporation law, so it might be wise to wait because the process currently requires a great amount of paper work for minimum benefits.

d) Translation of Bible into Auslan: John Hill reported that the project is being handled by the Bible Society's professional translators. Those initially approached from a range of denominations, including Catholics, are not now involved. He is not entirely happy about the situation.

7a) - Correspondence outgoing:

To Bishop Bede Heather inviting him to be the 2001 conference guest.

To Rev. Rod Letchford re. his non-election to membership due to absence of his sponsor and additional information at the year 2000 AGM, but inviting him to pursue election.

7b) Correspondence incoming:

From Angelo O'Hagan thanking the Association for life-membership, and accepting it.

From Bishop Bede Heather accepting the invitation to be the year 2001 guest.

Thanks from Anna Grant-Henderson for election to membership.

Thanks from Tim Meadowcroft for election to membership.

From Rev. Rod Letchford, candidate, re. inability to attend and acknowledging that this will prevent his candidature being considered this year.

From Rod Doyle, with a further address for an attempt to inform Adrian Coleridge of his election to membership at the year 2000 AGM. (All secretary's attempts to contact him at previous addresses, returned as 'Not at this address.' Further letter now sent to this new address. Mary Coloe hopes to meet him soon and will try to sort out the problem.)

8 - Election of new members:

Terence Arthur Grey: Proposed Charles Hill, seconded Moira O'Sullivan. Approved.

Elizabeth Dowling: Proposed Mary Coloe, seconded Brendan Byrne. Approved.

Sarah Hart: Masters not yet completed, but eligible for Associate membership,
Proposed (in writing) Alice Sinnott, seconded Tony Campbell. Approved.

9 - Treasurer's Report:

Balance sheet circulated prior to start of meeting. Treasurer reported the balance was satisfactory. IBD to stay as at present due to small capital invested which does nor enable investment in a higher interest area. Secretary/treasurer to decide on investment in different area when capital increases or other options become available.

Costs for day only attenders questioned: Treasurer replied that costs were reasonable when GST effect considered and the charges imposed by other venues. The costs did include meals and were lower than the previous day attendance costs at St. Vincent's College.

GST and the Association questioned: Treasurer reported that, to date, we did not qualify for an ABN because our actual 'income' is very small and well below the qualifying level at which the Tax office will issue an ABN, being only \$20 per member, any small amount remaining from the conference social cost levy, plus a little interest. The conference charge (which includes GST) for accommodation, meals etc. is made by the venue, our account is only used as a convenience for members in processing the money. A constant watch on tax rules is kept because changes keep occurring. One other approach might be to become an official organisation of the Church; currently we are an independent association. The membership subscription has not increased because we do not pay GST, so what would we gain with an ABN?

The Secretary/Treasurer announced that she was resigning because of personal family matters which were occupying an increasing amount of her time.

10 - General Business:

- a) Retired member guest for 2002. **Angelo O'Hagan**, proposed, Pamela Foulkes, seconded Charles Hill, unanimously approved.
 - b) Task force and letter resulting from ideas from joint session with ACTA on 'Woman and Man':

#The initial draft of the letter was to be reviewed by ACBA and ACTA prior to forwarding it to Frank Carroll, Chairman, Catholic Bishops Conference.

#Task force to be two persons from both ACBA and ACTA.

#Edited collection of joint session papers to be a job for the Task Force.

#Wide ranging discussion ensued on the wording of the draft letter. Several ideas regarding wording and changed order of topics were proposed.

#Noted that the letter should not stray far from the decisions made at the joint session.

#Letter emphasises; people's experiences, that the problems affect men and women, and that the prohibition on discussion of the ordination of women does not allow in-depth discussion of many of the problems raised in the report, "Woman and Man", which affect both sexes.

#A revised draft letter was read by the president. This will be discussed with the ACTA president (ACTA are also considering the original draft).

The president asked for approval to present the revised wording to the ACTA president for joint discussion: Approved with one abstention but no one against.

#Task Force:

- Four people, two from each association, to be gender balanced
- The brief is to be within the parameters of the letter
- The level of involvement with the Bishops' Conference would have to be decided by that Conference.
- The Task Force should report to the two associations next year.

ACBA members of Task Force:

Bernadette Kiley, Brian Boyle and Brendan Byrne declined nomination due to long standing commitments.

Elaine Wainwright nominated by Bernadette Kiley, seconded by Mary Coloe, approved by 19 members.

John Hill nominated by Margaret Beirne, seconded by Charles Hill, approved unanimously.

11 - Any other business:

Mary Coloe requested members to write their Email addresses on the list she is circulating. This will enable easier communication between many members as needs arise.

Mary Coloe requested that the association consider 'How we Name the Scriptures'. Agreed that this should be an item for general discussion during next year's conference, and that some email discussion could occur in the interim.

12 - Conference dates and venue, 2002:

8 Reflection on the Joint Session on "Ecclesia in Oceania"

- a) Members were happy with the process of circulating the papers beforehand and suggested that the same process be followed next year. Some members had trouble downloading David Pascoe's paper. It was agreed to check the membership list and update it (Marie Turner volunteered to do this). All except ten members are on email and the paper was posted to them.
- b) It was generally felt that there was little energy to form a group with ACTA to work on the document "Ecclesia in Oceania", but that communication with the bishops should be kept open.
- c) This led to a discussion in regard to the letter from the Bishops' Committee on Doctrine and Morals to Theological Colleges and other interested bodies on a follow-up to the "Woman and Man: One in Christ Jesus" report. Suggestions included an official response from ACBA, or two people to be nominated to formulate an unofficial response and circulate it by email for members' reactions. Veronica Lawson pointed out that Bishop Michael Putney had heard the group's reaction in the context of the discussion of the letter and that it be sufficient that he take back that discussion to the Bishops' Committee. The process of Bishops' attendance at the ACTA-ACBA meetings had been set up for just such a purpose and we should make use of this line of communication.
 - It was finally agreed that the Incoming President would write a letter to the Bishops' Committee on Doctrine and Morals, and that individuals could respond as they see fit. The letter should thank the bishops for their invitation to communicate with them and acknowledge the presence of Bishop Michael Putney at the ACTA-ACBA Meeting.
- d) In the matter of the Joint Session at the 2003 Conference on 3-6 July in Brisbane (date tentative at this stage), it was noted that time will be compressed as there will be overlap with ANZATS. ACTA is committed to some interaction with ANZATS and ACBA will also have interaction with ANZATS. An indigenous theologian, George Rosendale will be present at the ACTA Conference. The majority of members felt that having the meeting in Brisbane posed no problem. Dates for the ANZATS Conference were not available, but it was believed that at least one day will overlap.

It was suggested that for the Joint Session we invite CACW to speak with ACBA and ACTA, but it was unclear whether ACTA was in favour of this, given their commitments to other projects. Mary Reaburn suggested the 3pm Thursday time slot to meet with CACW. Members wondered what should be the outcome of discussions with CACW, but since a joint meeting would be held at the request of CACW, in response to our offer to be of assistance to them, any outcomes would be CACW's decision. It was agreed that ACBA and ACTA should meet with CACW on the Thursday afternoon and that Elaine Wainwright and John Hill from ACBA and Chris Burke and Richard Lennan from ACTA should be asked to liaise with CACW.

Brendan Byrne suggested discussion of the document, The Jewish People and their Sacred Scriptures in the Christian Bible. Mary Reaburn advised that the document is available on the Vatican web-site but that it is 100 pages long, and that it would be available from St Paul publications once the Toronto Youth Meeting is over. The suggestion was made that a Jewish speaker be invited, but members felt that it might not be appropriate to have a Jewish speaker since it would be a Christian discussion and that sensitivity was needed.

e) Mary Reaburn proposed that for the smooth organization of next year's Conference there should be two categories: either live-in, with full package, or non-live-in and without full package. Seconded Michael Trainor. Those not living in would have all meals except breakfast. Friday night meal would not be included for anyone. Proposal accepted and agreed.

9. Election of New Members

Nominations for Rod Letchford and Kathleen Rushton were not received by April 2002. These nominations are now to be passed to new executive in readiness for April 2003 (members unsure whether April 1 or 30 is the deadline). Both will be able to attend the Brisbane Meeting.

10. Treasurer's Report

Balance sheet circulated prior to start of meeting. Members registered our thanks to Mary Coloe for her Report. Members also registered their thanks to Mary for keeping us up to date with events through Ozbiblica and for her offer to continue as Secretary and Treasurer.

As regards organization of next year's conference, Anne Tuohy has agreed to liaise with Elaine Wainwright to investigate a Conference venue in Brisbane.

Bernadette Kiley proposed thanks to Mary Reaburn and Rom Barry for their organization of the 2002 Conference. Members expressed their thanks by acclamation.

11. General Business

(a) Michael Trainor informed the Meeting of his Colossae archaeological Project undertaken in conjunction with Claire Smith of Flinders University and Margaret O' Hay, a classical archaeologist at Adelaide University. They have made application for an ARC Grant of \$300,000 to begin excavating in two years' time. Liaison has taken place between the Adelaide team and Government officials and archaeologists in Turkey. Michael will be visiting Turkey in October. Details can be found on the Flinders University web-site.

(b) Laurie Woods suggested presenters at this year's Conference give an abstract of their paper for posting on the web-site. Members agreed. Short abstracts of papers to be sent to Laurie soon. It was noted Matthew Ogilvie is going to Boston and it is not known who will oversee the web-site.

- (c) Anne Elvey proposed that we adopt as a formal protocol the acknowledgement of the traditional owners of the land. People could repeat the acknowledgement at the start of their papers if they wished. Group supported the proposal. In places where ownership is in dispute a general acknowledgement can be made.
- (d) It was decided there was a need for accurate use of language in reference to Life Members, Retired Members and invited Guests. It was agreed that invited Guests should be restricted to those living in the locality of the Conference so that airfares are not borne by ACBA. Life Members and the invited Guest Member can come to the Conferences without paying conference fees or accommodation and meals costs.
 - Mary Reaburn proposed that Bill O' Shea be the invited Guest at the next conference.

 Agreed that Laurie Woods would invite Bill O'Shea and that ACBA would pay his costs, including taxi fares if any.
 - (e) Disappointment was expressed at the rearranging of the conference schedules when a speaker is transferred to another day other than for reasons of illness. Transfer to another time on the same day is not a problem. Members are asked to let Executive know in advance if they are requesting a time change. Members agreed.

12. Conference Dates and Venue, 2003

Anne Tuohy will investigate a Venue in Brisbane. Dates probably 3-6 July but uncertain at this stage as they are contingent upon the ANZATS dates and the booking of a venue. Will be circulated to members as soon as possible.

Constitution

Article I

The full name of this Association shall be

The Australian Catholic Biblical Association.

Article II

Purpose

Section 1

The general aim of this Association shall be to promote scholarly study of the Bible in accordance with the spirit and instructions of the Church.

Section 2

The special aims of this Association shall be

- a) to provide for mutual acquaintance and support and to facilitate the exchange of methods and ideas
- b) to constitute a body of informed opinion on matters biblical as a resource for the wider Church.

Article III

Membership

Section 1

The membership of this Association shall consist of Active members and Associate members. All members shall pay the same dues, and all shall enjoy the same rights and privileges except where the constitutions of the Association shall provide otherwise.

Section 2

Only active members shall exercise active and passive voice.

Section 3

Candidates for active membership must have an appropriate degree in biblical studies (at least at the level of Master or Licentiate), or must have equivalent professional competence in the area of biblical studies, demonstrated by the holding of an academic posting or by publication at an academic level.

Section 4

Any person or group in sympathy with the aims of the Association may duly be admitted to associate membership.

Section 5

The Annual General Meeting may confer Honorary Membership of the Association.

Section 6

Attendance at the annual conference shall be limited to active and associate members, and to guests invited by active members with the concurrence of the President. Papers at the annual conference shall be presented by active members only, or by others invited to do so by the Executive.

Section 4

The duties of the Treasurer shall be

- a) to receive the funds of this Association and to make disbursements as provided for by the Executive or by the Members in General Meeting
- b) to act as business manager of the periodical publications of the Association
- c) to submit to General Meetings a financial statement of the income and expenses of the Association
- d) to submit on request a financial statement to the Executive.

Section 5

Should an Editor be elected, the duties of the Editor shall be

a) to prepare for publication anything so approved by the General Meeting of the Association.

Article VI

Election of Officers

Section 1

The President, Vice-President, Secretary, and/or Treasurer, and Editor shall be elected by secret ballot at the Annual General Meeting.

Section 2

Terms of office shall extend from the end of the Annual General Meeting of election until the end of the next Annual General Meeting; the Secretary, and/or Treasurer, however, shall be elected for a three-year term. The President and Vice-President shall be ineligible for immediate re-election to their respective offices.

Section 3

Candidates for election to the Executive shall be proposed by two active members, who shall hand a written nomination to the Secretary in time for the nomination to be made known to the membership 24 hours before the Annual General Meeting.

Article VII

Constitution

Section 1

The Constitution of the Association is approved by the General Meeting. If necessary, the Executive may interpret articles of the Constitution between General Meetings.

Section 2

The Annual Membership fee will be determined by the General Meeting on the advice of the Treasurer.
